Heads up on the new Federal Boat If this tax is not Tax--Boo Boo! repealed by Congress, please note the following dates. You should purchase the decal by July 31, 1991 (cost \$50.00 for a C-34); however, there is a 30-day grace period. If you operate your boot without the decal ofter September 1, 1991, and you are stopped by the Coast Guard, you could be fined up to \$5,000.00. If you want the application form to pay by check, cell 1-800-368-5647. If you went to pay by credit card, call 1-800-848-2100. At this writing, I understand the repeal has passed the House, but has NOT YET made it through the Senate--so beware!

I'd also like to remind you that the deadline for articles for the November newsletter is October 15. Mark your calendar for our November 23 meeting at Solomons Island hosted by Jan and Walt Rupp--more info to follow.

THE GREAT GROG ISLAND DEMOLITION DERBY

Well I hope the northern Bay Raftup of May 18th had better luck than the southern Boy contingent. As planned by F. A. Bristow, the plan was to raft at Grog Island, Dymer Creek just north of the Rappahannock River. beach party was to be spectacular. F. A. had ice enough for Swartzkopf's army and the location was ideal.

Unfortunately, the weather wasn't Stiff northeast winds at 15 to 20 knots made it an uphill battle for the southern members. Al and Cyndi Blank and crew get the prize for most miles-- about 50 plus, all upwind. The anchorage was so bumpy, the fleet moved up stream into George's Cove where shelter was a pleasant relief. The afternoon and evening were spent comparing notes, boats, improvements, and swapping sailing struggles of the day. The attendees were Al and Cundi Blank DREAMWORKER, Ron and Phyllis Hill on APACHE, Harry and Alberta Dobbs on SHENANDOAH, F. A. and Opal Bristow on F. A.'s TOY, Gus and Dianne Moody on WINTERMOON, Bob and Jane Bierly on C'MON WIND and friends of Blank's on SPELLBINDER, a lonely O'day 34.

The next day the weather got worse. Twenty-five to 30 knots out the east with the usual accompanying 6 to 8 foot waves coming right up the entrance to Dymer Creek. After running into the mixmaster for a couple of hours, APACHE and SHENANDOAH retired to Creek (isn't Indian retirement wonderful, and safe!), SPELLBINDER blew an impeller on the raw water

engine cooler, probably when his intake cavitated, i.e. cleared the water in the short steep chop. So DREAMWORKER and SPELLBINDER, with 50 some miles facing them retired to Georges Cove to leave the boats until the following week and drive to Norfolk. WINTERMOON and F.A.'s TOY slammed out to Windmill Point then ran up the Rappahannock to home.

C'MON WIND was not so fortunate. We drove with reefed main and three bloded prop into the wind to Smith Point. The boat did very well except for falling off those square waves. One of them separated the hot water heater from the mounts on the hull. In case you haven't noticed, your water heater sits on a wooden pallet that is epoxied to the hull. Well, I can say that the epoxy will let go. I was fortunate that the heater hoses to the fresh water engine coolant system did not break, or I could well have lost engine, boat and all. The ironic thing is that by mid afternoon the wind had died from the 30's to 1 knot apparent as we approached our home marina off St. Mary's River. You might want to check to see if you can lift your Water Heater platform particularly if you have been salling on those square waves for which the Bay is so deservedly famous. It still was a good raft-up.

CATALOGS AND 800 NUMBERS

You probably think Radio Shack has just about everything you need to hook up your new DC gadgets, and at reasonable prices. I did. But there is an alternative. Take Walt Rupp's advice in our last newsletter and get a catalog from Hosfelt Electronics.

I called their 800 number on Friday afternoon and received their catalog on Tuesday. It is not as fancy as Radio Shack's, but the prices are better and the selection and service are good.

While I'm on the subject of catalogs, you owe it to yourself to deal with Jamestown Distributors (Rhode Island) for your hardware needs. They specialize in stainless, bronze, and brass fasteners. You won't believe the variety—from keel bolts to number 2s.

With shipping, it is cheaper than buying them at your local hard-ware store or chandelery (if you can even find the items). Jamestown also has an interesting assortment of tools and marine supplies.

They too have an 800 number, free catalog, good prices, service; and best of all, you can order by the piece rather than pre-packaged quantities.

PROP REPITCHING

In some early C-34 Mainsheet articles I saw that Dick Barck raved about the increase in his C-34 performance after he repitched his 3-bladed prop. This Spring I did the

same by repitching from a 15-9 (factory) to 15-10. Curtis Propeller in Temple Hills, Maryland, did the work in a week or two for about \$50.00. The following table is the outcome with the same boat, clean hull, no wind, and same Knot meter.

PROP	RPM	SPEED (Knots)
15 X 9	2500	5.7
15 x 10	2200	5.7
15 x 10	2500	6.7

With the factory 15 x 9 prop, I noted a .3 to .4 Knot drop in speed when towing a 9.2 ft. inflatable dinghy. Now the same dinghy has no degradeation of speed when towing with the repitched 15 x 10 propspeed at 2500 RPM is 6.7 Knots with or without the dinghy. With the factory prop, I could attain about 3450 max RPM. I now can attain 3200 max RPM (which is the HP RPM rating for the Universal 25 XP engine). I believe that \$50.00 is well worth the increase in performance.
